iMSSA FAQs

General Questions

- Do items on iMSSA reflect the diversity of students in New Mexico?
 - All new items are reviewed by educator committees for bias and sensitivity before being selected for field testing. Educators and other expert stakeholders from around the world participate in the review committees. Close to 130 professionals took part in more than 20 content reviews, and more than 85 participated in bias and sensitivity reviews. After items are field tested, item statistics are analyzed for bias against diverse subgroups of students, such as females, low-income students, English Learners, etc. If an item unfairly discriminates against a group, it may be eliminated from the test.
- Will New Mexico educators have the opportunity to review and write items for iMSSA?
 - The items on the iMSSA begin as items on the summative assessment and follow the process above. New Mexico educators have seats on the review committees that are described above. The items on the iMSSA are reviewed, not written by educators.
- Do the interim assessments replace the need for a summative? If we administer the BOY, MOY, and EOY iMSSA, do we still need to administer the NM-MSSA summative assessment?
 - The NM-MSSA is the state's federally required summative assessment; all students must participate. Cognia's iMSSA is an optional interim assessment; there are K5+ requirements per the 2021-2022 Assessment schedule.
- > Can schools only use the formative assessments or do we have to use both?
 - You can choose to use either.
- What grades and contents are available for the iMSSA assessments?
 - iMSSA is available for grades 3-8 in reading, language usage, and mathematics.
- What is the cost to the district to administer this program?
 - This is a state-supported program provided at no cost to the district.

Administration Questions

- Are interim assessments available during remote learning?
 - Yes, interim assessments are available during remote learning and can be administered using a browser. More information can be found in the <u>Browser Testing</u> <u>User Guide</u>. will also be a testing guide available to send home to families for additional support.
- How do we roster our students for iMSSA administration?
 - There will be no PED or Cognia loading of students for iMSSA administration. Districts will
 be rostering their own students into the iTester platform. This rostering can be done by
 uploading individual students or taking advantage of the bulk upload windows that precede

- Are there any common issues with uploading students?
 - Yes, a common mistake is omitting the leading zeros on district code, school code, and student date of birth (for example a DOB of 1/5/2010 should entered as 01/05/2010). Another common issue is not populating the accommodation fields in the file. If accommodation status is unknown at the time of Pre-ID upload, enter a "0" in the accommodations fields in the Pre-ID upload file. DTCs & STCs can add accommodations manually later or in bulk using the accommodation upload feature (see Portal User Guide, page 34).
 - What accommodations are available for the administration?
 - There is a document on the Help and Support site that outlines all universal tools, accessibility features, and accommodations available for each type of assessment. You can access that document by clicking the link here.
 - Is there a paper-based administration option for iMSSA?
 - No, these are all computer-based assessments.
 - Can students test using a kiosk, or do they need to use the browser?
 - Students can use either a kiosk or a browser. If students use a browser, they can navigate to https://newmexico.cognia.org/student/login to log into the test. If they use a kiosk, they should use the New Mexico Summative Assessment Kiosk, provided for the Spring 2021 assessments. If the kiosk was installed for Spring 2021 assessments, it can be used for any interim and formative assessments administered between now and the time new kiosks are available in early 2022. The kiosks can also be downloaded and installed as per the Kiosk installation manual. New kiosks will be made available February 2022 and will be required for the Spring summative assessments and any interim or formative assessments that you choose to administer using a kiosk after that time.
 - Where can I find the manuals to support administration?
 - All manuals are posted to the Help and Support site on the <u>iMSSA manuals tab</u>. The computer-based manuals that will support all administrations are posted to the <u>CBT guides</u> tab.

Content-based Questions

- Are iMSSA assessments standards-based?
 - iMSSA assessment items are aligned to college and career readiness standards, such as the Common Core State Standards and similar state standards.
 - ➤ Is the content available in Spanish?
 - The math content is available in Spanish.

Reporting Questions

- When will report information be available for students who have completed the iMSSA assessment?
 - Report information will be available to teachers in Data Interaction (the iTester reporting tool
 for schools) the day after students test. Information will be available to families through the
 Parent Portal one week after the close of the administration window.
